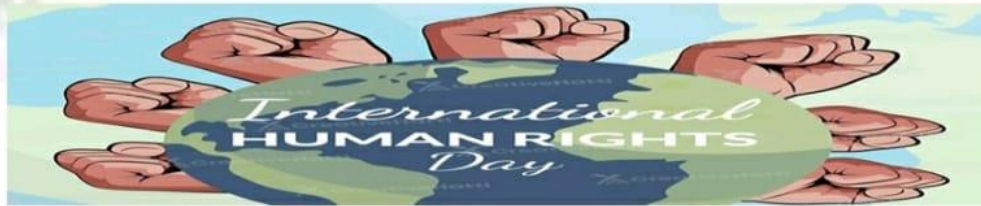

REPORT OF THE CELEBRATION OF INTERNATIONAL HUMAN
RIGHTS DAY

On 11th December 2023 International Human Rights Day was celebrated in our college. Prof K.S. Suresh, CEO, JSS Law College, Mysuru was the Chief Guest. Prof. Rajesh M.C. Coordinator of the programme welcomed the gathering on this occasion.



The chief guest in his address pointed out the aspect of the right to liberty and security of person can be limited where it is reasonable and demonstrably justified in a free and democratic society based on human dignity, equality and freedom. Every human being has the right to life, liberty and the security of his person. He cited Article 2- *“All persons are equal before the law and have the rights and duties established in this Declaration, without distinction as to race, sex, language, creed or any other factor.”* And said this is the very foundation of rights which constitution also focuses upon.



Further, He pointed out that Human rights are basic rights and freedoms inherent to all human beings. They recognize and protect the dignity of every person in the world, from birth until death. They are documented in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Some examples include a right to freedom of expression, and freedom of religion. Human Rights Day is observed every year on 10 December – the day on which the United Nations General Assembly adopted, in 1948, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights empowers us all. The principles enshrined in the Declaration are as relevant today as they were in 1948. We need to stand up for our own rights and those of others. We can take action in our own daily lives, to uphold the rights that protect us all and thereby promote the kinship of all human beings.

In December 1948, UNESCO was the first United Nations agency to place the Universal Declaration at the heart of all its action, to promote it across the world through education and the media. He further pointed out the challenges which women face with respect to protection of their rights, children right to privacy and rights of aged people. He concluded his lecture advising the students to respect their elders and teachers and only then they will succeed in their life.
